I have asked Jose Arreola to partner with me in making a presentation. Jose will be commissioned this August and is a fellow parishioner at Saint Marguerite. We have discerned that, if appropriate, we could make a presentation. It would be in panel style and would include one other person, Rosario Tovar, coordinator of the Hispanic Community at Saint Marguerite. We would work a thread of thought that would go like this: A summary of the V Encuentro and it's current goal for this diocese presented by Jose who is on the diocesan board and attended the V Encuentro, a summary of the parish process for Saint Marguerite (as an example for strengths and weaknesses) given by Rosario, and presentation of a model for strengthening a parish to implement the V Encuentro ideals for a unified parish community that I would present. (The model would be based on my graduate paper, Taking the Mystery Out of Mestizaje.) Both Jose and Rosario are bilingual, so, if desired, this could also be presented in English.
